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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Purpose: To provide needed maintenance and protection to regionally significant storm and irrigation water channel (known as Lindon Hollow Creek), and associated wetlands which provide natural pre-treatment of storm water discharges from the communities of Lindon, Orem, Pleasant Grove, Vineyard, and Cedar Hills, Utah.

Detailed Description of the Project.

Lindon Hollow Creek is a perennial waterway that carries storm water discharges and irrigation water in an east to west orientation near
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the southern border of Lindon, Utah. Storm water and irrigation water is directed to the Lindon Hollow Creek from multiple communities within Utah County, namely Lindon, Orem, Pleasant Grove, Vineyard, and Cedar Hills. This section of the creek is the terminus for water from irrigation usage as well as storm water runoff from non-point source locations in these communities. The project location encompasses the final 1.8 miles of the creek before discharging into Utah Lake. Lindon and Orem determined that the wetlands surrounding the creek provide a regionally significant storm water pre-treatment area before the storm and irrigation water enters into Utah Lake.

In the fall of 2008, pending development threatened the creek and associated wetlands. Acting to save a valuable storm water treatment area, the cities of Lindon and Orem pooled resources and, for a cost of \$1.4 million, purchased nearly 14 acres of the wetlands for preservation as a storm water detention and management area. Wetlands have been proven to be an effective measure in reducing storm water runoff pollutants and the area was considered a priority purchase for the cities. Prior to purchasing the wetlands, Lindon received letters of support from State and local agencies and was awarded \$150,000 of funding towards the purchase from the Utah State Governor's Office of Planning and Budget.

The City of Lindon and Pleasant Grove contracted with J-U-B Engineers to conduct a study of the contributing flows into the Lindon Hollow Creek and assessed the needed improvements to the waterway. From this study, it was determined what amount of discharged water each municipality contributes to the overall flows in the creek, and what specific improvements are needed to take place to preserve and protect the waterway. Although some portions of the creek along roadways necessitate piping the flows through culverts, the intent of the project is to maintain as much open-channel as possible in order to preserve natural habitat and storm water treatment capabilities.

The cities of Lindon, Orem, Vineyard, and Pleasant Grove are now entering into Interlocal Agreements to perform needed improvements along the creek channel necessary to maintain flows and to protect this waterway from encroaching development. As part of the purchase agreements with the seller of the wetlands, a portion of the creek is required to be relocated off of the seller's property by October 2010, thus necessitating immediate action by the cities involved.

The Lindon Hollow Scope and Opinion of Cost, prepared by city engineers, places the cost of the project at \$1,239,500. Lindon, Orem, Vineyard, and Pleasant Grove are negotiating cost sharing agreements between all jurisdictions that discharge into the creek. Due to the recent purchase to preserve the wetlands budgeted funds for construction are low and Lindon is in need of new funding to facilitate completion of the channel improvements by the October 2010 deadline required as part of our purchase agreement.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The funds will be used to make the necessary improvements to the Lindon Hollow Creek described in the J-U-B Engineering Report, titled "Hollow Ditch existing capacity analysis, flow analysis, and recommendations." Federal funding will be used for design engineering, construction engineering, and project construction consisting of bank stabilization, erosion control, channel improvements, installation of culverts, and installation of outlet control point structures.

- 1 Spiro Treatment Plant to Boothill Reservoir - - Construct 3000 ft of 16' water transmission pipeline to replace an existing 12", rehabilitate the existing 12" waterline and connect to an existing well water supply at the reservoir to provide blending water to Spiro to meet "antimony " drinking water standards.
- 2 Boothill Reservoir to Chatham Pump Station - - Construct 3500 ft of new 16" transmission pipeline to add capacity to the existing pump station and improve fire flows in the area
- 3 Replace undersized distribution - - Five (5) projects to upsize 6" water lines to 8" water lines to comply with current Utah Division of Drinking Water Standards and current fire flow requirements

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would be used to develop plans, specifications and to construct the projects in priority order.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Park City's Water System must now comply with federally mandated Clean Water Regulations which have become very onerous on the community. Over all water demand has increased in the last twenty five (25) years at a rate that was not anticipated cause by an increase in permanent population. In addition, Park City has experienced significant commercial growth. Transmission and distribution waterlines built thirty years ago were not planned to accommodate this additional level of water demand. These projects will construct new larger diameter waterlines to meet current and future requirements.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Federal funds would be used to construct a sewer system for the undeveloped area east of Provo Airport, which would enhance the environment of the area and develop sustainable infrastructure.

Detailed Description the Project.

Infrastructure funding under the EPA STAG account provides financial assistance to States, municipalities, and tribal governments to fund a variety of water and wastewater projects. These funds are essential to fulfilling the federal government's commitment to provide adequate funding to construct the facilities that comply with federal environmental requirements to ensure public health and revitalize contaminated properties. This project will provide basic environmental protection and public water system supervision, which are both considered to be core priorities of the EPA STAG program.

Background

The Clean Water Act, which is the cornerstone of surface water quality protection in the United States, was enacted with the goal of

sharply reducing direct pollutant discharges into waterways, finance municipal wastewater treatment facilities, and manage polluted runoff, with the broader goal of restoring and maintaining the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of the nation's waters.

During the last decade, more attention has been given to the physical and biological integrity of water systems, rather than sole focus on chemical aspects, as was done in prior years. Also, more attention has been paid to "wet-weather" sources, such as runoff from streets, construction sites, and farms as opposed to regulating discharges from traditional "point source" facilities, such as municipal sewage plants and industrial facilities. Starting in the late 1980s, efforts to address polluted runoff have increased significantly.

Project Overview

The Provo Westside Wastewater Infrastructure Development project would construct and provide sanitary sewer infrastructure to an undeveloped area east of the Provo Municipal Airport. As this area becomes home to commercial and residential development, the need for a reliable sewer system is readily apparent. This project will eliminate the need for two private sewer lift stations and one public sewer lift station in the region. Sewer lift stations are maintenance intensive, expensive to operate, and pose a significant risk of unwelcome sewage backups in the event of failure. Eliminating lift stations also reduces maintenance and operation costs and lowers the risk of a costly sewage backup. And because the public lift station exclusively services the Utah Lake State Park, the general public benefits.

Furthermore, with sewer utilities available, use of the airport will be more convenient and desirable, providing a more sustainable future for airport development.

Specifically, federal funds would allow the purchase and installation of 1,738 feet of 18-inch Sewer Pipe, 3,438 feet of 15-inch PVC Pipe, 628 feet of 12-inch PVC Pipe, 3,368 feet of 8-inch force main, and one Sewer Lift Station. The total cost of the project is \$1,990,000. Should full funding of this request be granted in FY 2010, no future funding requests are anticipated.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The total cost of the project is \$1,990,000. EPA-STAG awards require a 45 percent local match—in this case, \$895,500—which the City would provide from the City's Wastewater Capital Improvements Fund. Provo City is seeking \$1,094,500 from the federal government, which is 55 percent of the total cost of the project.

Completion of this vital project will support ongoing operations at the Provo Municipal Airport, and provide the basic environmental protection to meet the goals of the EPA STAG program.

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

The South Salt Lake Waterline Replacement Project will replace approximately 16,000 linear feet of existing 4-inch water mains with 8- and 10-inch ductile iron waterlines to meet current State fire suppression codes.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The current water distribution system consists of undersized 4-inch unlined cast-iron pipes that do not meet current State fire suppression codes. Waterline replacement is prioritized based on whether adequate fire protection is available and on the number of leaks that have occurred on the line. Providing adequate fire protection to the residents of South Salt Lake is the top priority and will benefit the general public.

The project will replace existing 4-inch water mains with 8- and 10-inch ductile iron waterlines to meet current State fire suppression codes and will serve roughly half of the City population. Without being able to meet current State fire suppression codes, the City's residents are at risk of increased damages due to potential fires, which is all the more worrisome considering some of the tremendous fires that have occurred nearby in the recent past, particularly near the Union Pacific rail lines and on I-80, both of which are in the City limits.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

\$1,000,000 for Spanish Fork, UT for sewer and water infrastructure rehabilitation

Detailed Description the Project.

This project will rehabilitate the clay tile sewer mains in the central part of Spanish Fork City. These clay pipes were put into the ground in the 1920's and 30's and while they have served the citizens for over 80 years, the city now experiences infiltration through these clay pipes which significantly reduces the capacity of our sewer and wastewater treatment plant.

The city has developed a plan to rehabilitate all these deficient sewer mains and have been able to determine problem areas. Funding for this project will increase the efficiency of our sewer system, including the lines and the treatment process and eliminate several problems causing sewer back up in residential homes within our community. While significant dollars have been budgeted by the city (detailed in the question below), additional federal assistance would allow this replacement project to be accelerated. This is desperately needed given the structural integrity of the existing 80+ year old clay pipes.

Spanish Fork also has many city blocks which were originally constructed with 4 and 6 inch water mains. These water mains do not meet state standards for fire flow and must be expanded in diameter to address public safety concerns. In addition, replacement would also allow the city to address significant losses in treated water resulting from leaks.

While careful planning has allowed the city to make progress in replacing approximately 25% of these pipes, overwhelming costs to water users have prevented us from making these important infrastructure replacements more rapidly. Project funding would allow us to complete the replacement project while minimizing disruption and additional costs that results from frequently tearing up streets to replace the water mains.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funding would be used for costs associated with rehabilitating sewer mains and leaking water infrastructure

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Funding is desperately needed to help the city to more rapidly rehabilitate the structural integrity of sewer and water infrastructure that is 80 plus years old and results in the inefficient use of water.

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

Capital Improvements for storm water infrastructure in the City of Taylorsville, Utah.
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Detailed Description the Project.

At the time of its incorporation from Salt Lake County in 1996, the City of Taylorsville was mostly built-out and a storm water infrastructure for the city, although antiquated, was already in place. Beginning in the 1920s, farmland began expanding further south and west of the Jordan River (Taylorsville's main drainage route), and irrigation conveyance systems were developed. These systems consisted of canals and ditches, where the tail waters were discharged back to the natural storm water system. Some of these systems are still in place and functioning today, although they have been modified, piped, and worked around as farm land was subdivided and sold to developers beginning in the early 1970s.

In many cases, newly-constructed subdivisions used these irrigation systems to convey storm water; hence, much of the storm water infrastructure within what is now the City of Taylorsville was constructed ad hoc as this development occurred. At the time, the standard

pipe used for storm water conveyance was made of corrugated metal, and had a life expectancy of 30 years. Salt Lake County owned and maintained the system until the incorporation of the City of Taylorsville in 1996, at which point Salt Lake County was contracted to continue maintenance of the system.

The vast majority of storm water infrastructure within the City of Taylorsville has surpassed its intended life expectancy, and is experiencing eroding and collapsing pipes. Additionally, the system is undersized for Taylorsville's current needs. At present, the City of Taylorsville has co-permitted with Salt Lake County with the goal of fulfilling the federal NPDES requirements. This program aims to address the quality of storm water before it is discharged to natural conveyance systems (in this case, the Jordan River). In anticipation of a large number of maintenance, upgrades, and water quality requirements needed for the overall system, the City has developed a storm water utility fee assessed to residents and businesses. This fee was based on operation, and capital improvement projects needed for the next 15 years, totaling nearly \$8,000,000.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The requested funding would be used to assist the City of Taylorsville in complying with federal and state water quality requirements, addressing infrastructure problems before they become safety concerns, and maintaining a storm water system that has already passed its life expectancy.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

This project establishes a Desert Garden and educational facilities, including fish refugium.

Detailed Description the Project.

This project establishes a Desert Garden and educational facilities, including fish refugium. This is of value to Washington County Water Conservancy District, City of St. George, Red Cliff Desert Reserve and Virgin River Recovery Program. *Washington County Water Conservancy District (WCWCD)* and *City of St. George* have each implemented a water conservation plan. This plan establishes programs to help decrease water use throughout the region. Each has identified education as a key component in their water conservation plan. Through education, these agencies' encourage conservation and promote responsible use of the water resources within the community. The scope of the *Virgin River Recovery Program* includes native fish recovery, water management, floodplain protection, restoration, and community outreach. The program is a collaborative effort between local, state, and federal partners to balance human interests and native fish needs along the Virgin River Basin. *Red Cliff Desert Reserve* is the result of the Washington County Habitat Conservation Plan. This plan was developed to protect species in the county listed under the Endangered Species Act.

This project is an opportunity where four agencies can pool their resources and expertise and reach their objectives while making a distinctive, educational center. Each agency has diverse but conducive goals which can be satisfied through this educational project. Through education, residents can feel an obligation and see the value in implementing conservation practices.

The project will have a three-fold purpose. First, the center will offer education on water efficiency through alternative landscapes. The demonstration garden will exhibit an attractive and sustainable landscape suitable to our region. This region's unique desert environment has three distinct ecosystems coming together; the Mojave, the Great Basin and the Colorado Plateau. The garden will bring the flora of these three ecosystems together.

Second, the project will support recovery of the federally-listed woundfin minnow and will provide a refugium where the fish can be placed. Refugia are critical to the fish's survival and eventual recovery. Recent floods and runoff from wildfire areas almost completely wiped out populations of the woundfin in the wild and off site hatchery refugia in NM and AZ allowed the fish to survive. A local refugium will provide a sanctuary and opportunities for temporary holding of fish as needs arise. The refugium is designed to replicate local stream conditions in the Virgin River with similar gradients and habitat. It is hoped that the woundfin will not only survive in the refugium, but also reproduce and provide offspring that can then be stocked on an annual basis.

Lastly, the project will be a gateway into the reserve for responsible recreation use of the reserve trail system by providing a point of contact for information dispersal to visitors and users of the area. These trails will educate users on the endangered and threatened species in Washington County.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would used for design and construction of facilities.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

JUSTIFICATION:

With looming water crisis and population issues, urban sprawl has put stress on water, native habitat and native species. This county is home to numerous endangered fish, birds, reptiles, plants and other species. It is said that this relatively small county has more endangered species than the remainder of the State of Utah. There is a great need for increased awareness and understanding for endangered species and appropriate resource management.

Washington County is a unique community which deals with one of the most difficult dilemmas-- water. Second only to Nevada, Utah is the driest state in the nation. The county's average precipitation is eight inches. The desert climate and low precipitation renders the county's water supply limited and unpredictable.

The population of the region has doubles in the past ten years and even tripled in the past 20 years. From 2000 to 2006, St. George metro area was the fastest-growing city in the nation with a growth rate of 39.9 percent. Washington County with a growth of 6.5 percent was ranked 20th in the nation from July 1, 2005 to July 1, 2006. This area is nestled among several National Parks and National Monuments. Tourism is the main source of the economy.

Undergraduate Ecological Field Studies in the Pine Valley Mountains, Utah

Detailed Description the Project.

<p>Increasing human pressures on ecosystems are contributing to the decline of diverse and ecologically sustainable habitats. Increasingly ecological sciences are used as a means to understand and counteract threats to biodiversity and essential ecosystem services. The most important component of any ecological study is the people who are involved. Our best strategy to prepare for the ecological challenges of the future is through the thorough training of young ecological scientists who will be the leaders and decision makers of the future. The proposed project is aimed at giving college level students the opportunity to participate in field ecological research, in collaboration with experienced scientists, which will help prepare them for the real world challenges ahead.</p> <p>Dixie State College of Utah is ideally located for field based undergraduate training and research. Three major desert ecosystems are</p>

locally represented (the Mojave, Great Basin, and Colorado Plateau deserts), all of which can be accessed with less than an hour's drive. The Pine Valley Mountains contain elements of all 3 systems and as a result it is of special ecological interest. Dixie State College, in collaboration with the Forest Service, would like to use parts of this area for the ecological training of its fast-growing body of undergraduate biology students (currently around 150 students are majoring in biology).

Project outline

The project will focus on key aims, including:

1. Basic undergraduate training in ecological research and data collection. Activities will include (a) learning how to measure important abiotic factors, (b) plant and small animal identification and surveying, and (c) investigating plant-animal interactions in the context of different macrohabitats. Undergraduate courses in General Ecology, Plant Physiology, Entomology, Ichthyology, Herpetology and Mammalogy will all have a field based lab component developed for the area.

2. More advanced student training (via independent research projects) will include the design of field sampling strategies to achieve specific research goals, summer-term field work and laboratory analyses of samples, and data analysis using appropriate statistical methods and GIS tools. A key component of senior student training will be the presentation of results to their peers during annual project conferences that will include project participants and stakeholders. By making use of the special expertise of faculty at Dixie State College and their collaborators, independent undergraduate research projects will be offered in the following areas:

(a) Patterns of toxic metal and trace mineral distribution in surface soils in critical habitats and the use of GIS tools to assess potential impacts (in collaboration with Kansas State University).

(b) Plant studies involving photosynthesis, respiration, and water and nutrient acquisition (in collaboration with the University of California in Santa Barbara). Two native shrub species are known to display forms of plant communication. Current plans are to establish long term removal experiments to study the ramifications of communication and resource competition in these shrubs.

(c) Field experiments on the foraging ecology of small mammals.

(d) Levels of gene flow and/or isolation between field populations of different plants and animals.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The main portion of the \$150,000 to \$200,000 of requested federal funding will be used to purchase scientific data collection equipment. Dixie State College has already purchased one set of the basic equipment needed for some of the courses, although students will have much more hands on experience if additional equipment and also additional sets of currently used equipment can be acquired. Equipment in Dixie State's Molecular Biology Lab was purchased with a grant from LiCor and a private donation. Additional funding will greatly facilitate the support and maintenance of this lab equipment. Many of the planned field activities will involve students camping out, and part of the funding will go towards the purchase of basic camping equipment (tents, sleeping bags, cookware, backpacks etc.) and also travel to and from camping and study sites.

For the 1st two years federal funding will support the cost of consumables. After the program is up and running the biology faculty at Dixie State College will be in a favorable position to apply for research funds to support ongoing project costs. Ongoing costs will be minimal compared to the cost of purchasing all the initial hard-ware and equipment.

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

Weber County has existing storm water management problems that have grown along with the development and the associated impermeable surfaces. A large portion of the development is taking place east of the I-15 corridor creating a significant storm water run-off problem for areas west of that corridor.

In recent years the Farr West City area in particular has suffered significant damage as a result of insufficient capacity to retain, contain, or channel the flows resulting from rain storms or snow melt. Smaller communities such as Farr West, Hooper, Roy, West Haven, and others do not have the financial capacity to deal with these issues, therefore, Weber County is taking the lead on attempting to resolve these problems that fail to recognize local political or jurisdictional boundaries. A regional approach is the only way to successfully address this issue.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Federal funds would be allocated to the most critical storm water control problems by providing new and enhanced detention basins, improved canal development and maintenance, and culvert replacements to better handle the capacity problems.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Congress has consistently funding similar projects through the EPA State and Tribal Assistance Grant Program administered by the Office of Compliance and Enforcement. These program funds are directed toward assisting communities in meeting water related need, including storm water needs. Federal matching requirements will be met and federal funding would be directed to the countywide / regional approach to storm water management problems while assisting smaller communities that would not have the financial capacity to address these issues on their own.
