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
Going forward, Senator Bennett will continue to work to represent Utah's interests by ensuring Utah's priorities are adequately represented with congressionally directed spending.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

An appropriation of \$5 million from the Land and Water Conservation Fund will be used by the Forest Service to acquire the 320-acre Ashdown Gorge property, an inholding within the 7,000-acre Ashdown Gorge Wilderness Area featuring three trails used by backpackers in the national forest and nearby Cedar Breaks National Monument, that is located twenty miles east of Cedar City in the Dixie National Forest.

Detailed Description the Project.

An appropriation of \$5 million will be used by the Forest Service to acquire the 320-acre Ashdown Gorge property. The tract has been in family ownership for over 100 years and is completely surrounded by the Ashdown Gorge Wilderness Area. The property has been historically used for grazing and timber harvesting. Except for the remains of an historic sawmill and a makeshift cabin, the properties have been left in a natural state with conifer forests and open meadows. The terrain consists of level ground, surrounded by steep hillsides.

Rattlesnake Creek runs through the property and is joined by several smaller tributaries in the narrow red-rock canyons below. Trails along the streambed are used to access Flannigan's Arch, just a couple of miles downstream.

As suggested, a white paper describing the project in greater detail is attached with this request.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

An appropriation of \$5 million will be used by the Forest Service to acquire the 320-acre Ashdown Gorge property to be managed as part of the Dixie National Forest. The Land and Water Conservation Fund does not require matching funds for federal acquisition projects. It is anticipated that the project can be completed and the property acquired by the U.S. Forest Service in FY 2010 upon the allocation of funds. Furthermore, no additional appropriations would be required in the future related to this particular project.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Cedar City's tremendous growth in recent years has, in part, been based upon the area's spectacular scenery and outdoor recreation opportunities. The city's growing population will place greater demand on local hiking trails and water resources. For tourists, Cedar Breaks National Monument remains a popular destination, and the Ashdown Gorge inholdings are prominent from the monument's many viewpoints. Protecting the Ashdown Gorge inholdings from development and enhancing public access would benefit both residents and tourists, and sustain the area's economic vitality and quality of life. The Ashdown Gorge is a popular destination for backpacking and hiking with three heavily used trails traversing the properties, connecting Cedar Breaks National Monument and the Ashdown Gorge Wilderness area to the canyons near Cedar City.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Assess the environmental impact of synthetic and natural hormonally compounds on native trout populations in East Canyon Creek and Silver Creek.
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Detailed Description of the Project.

<p>New chemical detection methods and a greater focus on water quality monitoring have generated a significant interest in the pharmaceuticals, personal care products and other compounds that are making their way into the nation's rivers and streams. Measurable amounts of pharmaceuticals including medications for pain, medications for depression and colds, synthetic hormones (ex. birth control pills) and other compounds are all being detected in samples from wastewater treatment plants (WWTP). Some of these products contain endocrine disrupting compounds (EDC's) that researchers have determined may harm aquatic life including trout populations. Estrogenic EDC's present in WWTP effluents are capable of feminizing fishes downstream of WWTP discharges as well as producing contraceptive-like effects.</p> <p>The Snyderville Basin Water Reclamation District (District) operates two wastewater treatment plants that discharge into small trout streams. Due to the rapid growth in the Park City area and the increasing demand for water, the District's effluent is increasingly a larger and larger percentage of the actual stream flow. During critical summer months, the District's effluent may make up as much as 95% of the actual stream flow. Therefore, trout populations and down stream water users may be exposed to EDC's present in the effluent from the treatment plants. While there are no current regulatory requirements for the District to sample for or address EDC's, the District's</p>

Board of Trustee's have taking a proactive position to determine if EDC's are present and how to remove them from the environment. Initial samples from both treatment plants have determined that EDC's are present in the effluents from both plants. The District believes that it is the first agency in Utah to address EDC's and that it is a harbinger of things to come for the rest of the State of Utah.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would be used to conduct additional water sampling for EDC's, fish assessment studies to determine if feminization is taking place of downstream fishes and lastly how to remove EDC's from the effluent of the treatment plants.

Justification for Use of Taxpayer Funds for this Project.

This is an opportunity to take a proactive position on a serious environmental issue and to pass on the knowledge to others throughout the State of Utah.

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

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would be allocated through the Utah Department of Agriculture to help establish a permanent easement joining multiple private properties with recreational opportunities originating from Rendezvous State Park. The UDAF would facilitate contract management and disbursement of funds.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Tax paying citizens would be provided with the opportunity of public access on private ground situated among one of the few, large expanses of property in the Bear Lake Valley. The plans for the Bear Lake Gateway project would include a pathway for recreational purposes that exhibit wildlife in their natural setting along Big Spring Creek, with access points from Rendezvous State Park and from Highway 30. Water quality would be improved after stream bank stabilization practices occur using water quality 319 money. The completion of this project would protect the cultural history of the area as well as sustain viable agricultural production in the Bear Lake Region.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Part of a \$2.4 million purchase of a critical 700 acre property to be acquired in fee for the inclusion in the refuge.

Detailed Description the Project.

Western Rivers Conservancy is protecting an in-holding of the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge, a crucial component of the Great Salt Lake Ecosystem. The marshes at the mouth of the Bear River are the largest freshwater component of this ecosystem. Sixty percent of the Great Salt Lake's water comes from the Bear River.

The Bear River Basin, located in northeastern Utah, southeastern Idaho and southwestern Wyoming, comprises 7,500 square miles of mountain and valley lands. Three hundred-fifty miles in length, the Bear River crosses state boundaries five times and is the largest stream

in the western hemisphere that does not empty into the ocean; instead it ends up in the Great Salt Lake. This landscape is unique in that it is entirely enclosed by mountains, thus forming a huge basin with no external drainage outlets. The Bear River is the largest tributary to the Great Salt Lake.

Western Rivers Conservancy is working to permanently protect critical parts of this nationally significant wetland complex. We have a great opportunity to add lands to the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge. Western Rivers Conservancy's purchase of a 700-acre property will add to the 74,000-acre Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge, a globally-important area for many species of migrating birds. The Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge lies where the Bear River flows into the northeast arm of the Great Salt Lake. The Refuge protects the marshes found at the mouth of the Bear River; these marshes are the largest freshwater component of the Great Salt Lake ecosystem. Since these marshes are surrounded by arid desert lands, it is little wonder that they have always been an oasis for waterfowl.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

100% to land purchase of 700-acre tract within the Refuge Boundary.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Acquisition of the 700 acre Yates property for inclusion in the Refuge will help with insuring compatible land use with the refuge, which is particularly important given the proximity of this parcel to the Visitor's Center, and the ability to manage water that will supplement the existing Refuge management regime. The Refuge plays an important economic role for this part of Utah by bringing in the areas of tourism, birding, cattle grazing and duck hunting. The Bear River Refuge has national significance as a Hemispheric Shorebird Reserve, and acquisition of this key parcel will help protect the existing federal investment there.



To continue the internet oil and gas lease pilot program within BLM and provide funding for the pilot program

Detailed Description the Project.

In FY07, Congress granted statutory authority to the Bureau of Land Management to expand its oil and gas lease activities to include a pilot program to determine the feasibility of conducting on-line oil and gas lease auctions. BLM have identified a private sector partner to help develop this capability and has made significant progress in developing the framework and the computer infrastructure to begin this pilot program. With the technological challenges resolved, BLM is now in the position to begin conducting lease sales using this technology. These funds will be used to conduct up to ten BLM lease sales in targeted BLM pilot field offices.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

\$2,500,000 to be used to expand the pilot program to conduct up to 10 on-line oil and gas lease sales throughout the BLM pilot field offices

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

This will save taxpayer dollars by increasing the efficiency of the BLM leasing program and will help increase the potential pool of bidders for BLM properties. It will modernize the BLM lease program.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

An appropriation of \$1.5 million from the Land and Water Conservation Fund will be used by the Forest Service to acquire a 150-acre property along the Bonneville Shoreline Trail in North Ogden in Weber County.

Detailed Description the Project.

The Bonneville Shoreline Trail was initiated in 1990 to create, protect, and expand a trail corridor along the prehistoric shoreline of Lake Bonneville and along the foothills of the Wasatch mountains from Ogden to Provo. This partnership has been so successful that the communities in Cache and Box Elder counties have worked to extend the trail north. The 150-acre North Ogden property is a high

priority for protection by the U.S. Forest Service. The property serves as important habitat for deer and elk and as an important buffer for fire protection for the rapidly developing area along the Wasatch Front. The property also provides watershed protection for neighboring areas in addition to key recreational resources.

As suggested, a white paper describing the project in greater detail is attached with this request.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The North Ogden property was first requested in FY 2009. As the FY 2009 appropriations bill has not yet passed, it is not known if funding will be available for the project in FY 2009. The Forest Service has actively acquired lands in recent years for the Bonneville Shoreline Trail. This project continues the program of purchasing land along the trail to provide for public access, recreation, and improved land management. The Land and Water Conservation Fund does not require matching funds.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The North Ogden program is a partnership effort to provide a new stretch of the BST along the northern boundaries of North Ogden and Pleasant View, within the boundaries of the national forest. In 2005, a five-mile stretch of the BST along North Ogden and Pleasant View was secured through a trail easement along an existing utility corridor granted to the nonprofit Weber Pathways. The property available for protection this year is critical to the North Ogden program because it will bring Forest Service ownership to this stretch of the BST and add critical trail access to the citizens in this area of the state. Protection of this property will also protect beautiful views of the foothills of the Wasatch Front and Ben Lomond Peak, one of Weber County's most important landmarks, while conserving important wildlife habitat and winter range along this rapid growth area.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Federal funds would be used to install a two million gallon water tank and two separate connections to existing culinary water lines to improve Brigham's overall culinary water supply and ensure that water resources are available in emergency situations.

Detailed Description the Project.

Infrastructure funding under the EPA STAG account provides financial assistance to States, municipalities, and tribal governments to fund a variety of water projects. These funds are essential to fulfilling the federal government's commitment to provide adequate funding to construct the facilities that comply with federal environmental requirements to ensure public health and revitalize contaminated properties. This project will provide basic environmental protection and public water system supervision, which are both considered to be core priorities of the EPA STAG program.

In seeking to improve the culinary water system on Brigham's west side, the City has identified several areas of improvement that have the highest priority. Successful completion of this project will enhance the City's water resources for safety purposes, as well as improve the overall culinary water supply system. The Brigham City Waterline Improvements project is comprised of two separate components:

- 1200 W. from Forest to 600 N: this aspect of the project provides a looped water system that will increase both the water volumes and pressures for the business and industrial customers in the northwest quadrant of the City's culinary water supply system.
- 1200 W. from 600 S. to Forest: this component of the project provides the redundancy needed to provide water and fire protection in the southwest quadrant as well as the culinary demand that will be placed on the City's water supply due to the future development of a large, commercial enterprise in the northwest section of the City's limits.

Brigham City is requesting \$839,850 to begin construction activities and installation of these various waterline improvements. The total cost of these improvements is \$1,527,000, and EPA STAG awards require a 45 percent local share of the cost. In this case, the remaining \$687,150 required to complete the project would be provided by Brigham City redevelopment funds.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The total cost of the project is \$1.527 million. EPA STAG grants require a 45 percent local match. Brigham City is requesting 55 percent of the total cost, or \$839,850, and would provide the remaining 45 percent—\$687,150—from the City's redevelopment funds. A detailed breakdown of the costs of the various components of the project is listed below:

The 2000 Census pegged South Jordan's population at 29,437. Since that time, the population has grown to 53,391 and is expected to grow to more than 102,000 by 2030, according to the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget. As a result, South Jordan's water system presently suffers from inadequate storage capacity to accommodate existing demands. As part of the city's master water plan, the addition of a drinking water storage tank and associated transmission lines would allow the city to remedy this situation, while also providing a secondary benefit of enhanced fire protection for the city's residents. Additional storage will also allow the city's system to operate more efficiently.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would be used to initiate construction of drinking water storage tank and associated transmission lines as part of the city's master plan.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

South Jordan has experienced significant growth and is in need of assistance to facilitate additional storage in meeting the city's drinking water storage needs. This would also allow the city's system to operate more efficiently.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

The goal of this project is to upgrade **50+ year-old water and wastewater infrastructure** while maintaining affordable housing and eliminating deterioration in a **low to moderate income neighborhood**.

Detailed Description of the Project.

During 1960-62, the Jamarl Acres subdivision was developed. The subdivision has 350 single family dwellings. The 2000 Census identified this area to have more than 50 percent of the residents as low to moderate income individuals/families.

The original infrastructure for the subdivision has not been replaced or upgraded. As a result, the ability to supply the necessary fire protection is ***below national standards***. The sanitary sewer lines serving as collector lines for the subdivision are ***undersized***, requiring the sewer lines to receive maintenance cleaning twice a year. Currently this subdivision area has ***no piped storm drainage system***; consequently, some properties experience continual flooding with only moderate rain storms.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The project would consist of the following: (1) installing approximately 17,000 lineal feet of water lines, replacing 4" and 6" lines with 8" and 10" lines, 40 new fire hydrants, and new water service lines to each lot; (2) replace approximately 4,000 lineal feet of 8" sanitary sewer lines with 10" lines; (3) install a piped storm drainage system consisting of approximately 3,000 lineal feet of pipe with gutter inlet boxes and replacing deteriorated sections of curb and gutter.

Justification for use of taxpayer funds for this project.

It is critical to update this infrastructure for the residents and taxpayers of the area to prevent major damage or potential flooding. Federal funding is critical for local projects in Clearfield. Any federal help is greatly appreciated.

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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

An appropriation of \$1.4 million from the Forest Legacy Program will secure a conservation easement on the 1,862-acre Dry Lakes Ranch in Iron County which is near the Brian's Head resort area, Cedar City, and a variety of public land and recreation attraction including Dixie National Forest, Cedar Breaks National Monument, and Zion and Bryce Canyon national parks.

Detailed Description the Project.

Funding will secure a conservation easement on the 1,862-acre Dry Lakes Ranch. Adjacent to BLM lands, the property is also strategically located near 8,250 acres of other previously protected Forest Legacy projects and within one mile of the Dixie National Forest. It is also in close proximity to thousands of acres located in a state wildlife management and reserve area. Forested with aspen, white fir, spruce, Gambel oak and mountain mahogany, the ranch provides crucial habitat for fawning mule deer and calving rocky mountain elk, crucial summer range for Merriam's turkey and year-round range for blue grouse. Sensitive species in the area include the three-toed woodpecker, Sonoran mountain king snake, goshawk, and pika; federally protected species include the California condor and Mexican spotted owl.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

FY 2010 is the first year that funding for this project has been requested. The Forest Legacy Program is very active in Utah, protecting working ranchlands and forestlands. To date, Utah has compiled an impressive record of conservation through FLP, protecting nearly 58,000 acres in several Forest Legacy focus areas. The Forest Legacy Program requires a match of 25%; in this case the landowner is committed to donating 25% of the property's value as cost-share match.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The ranch is adjacent to the Brian Head Scenic Byway, which provides direct access through the dramatic Parowan Canyon to the Dixie National Forest, Ashdown Gorge Wilderness, and Cedar Breaks National Monument. Dry Lakes Ranch has abundant water resources on and near the property. There are 40 springs and numerous small lakes, as well as Dry Lake Creek, which crosses the property, and Braffits Creek, which is adjacent to the property on the east side. Several wetlands on the ranch provide valuable riparian habitat that helps maintain and improve the water quality in the watershed. Conserving the ranch will also protect critical water supplies for Parowan City, which uses a spring downstream from Dry Lakes Ranch to provide culinary water for its residents. These abundant water resources on the property were very important to the survival of four prehistoric cultures including the Fremont and Piute and arrowheads from these tribes are still found on the ranch today. Due to its location only 30 minutes from Cedar City, three hours from Las Vegas, and less than one hour from Zion and Bryce Canyon national parks, the property is highly attractive for development. Demand for second homes and recreation in the area has resulted in the conversion of nearby private properties into subdivisions, with over 14,000 lots subdivided within a 20-mile radius of the ranch. The landowners of the property have a strong desire to keep the entire ranch in its pristine condition to protect the forest, wildlife habitat, water resources, and quality of life.

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

Eagle Mountain City is in the process of purchasing the right to use up to 10,000 acre feet of water from the Central Utah Water Conservation District. This line will provide a connection to a point on the system to be installed by Central Utah, and allow the City to have access to this water. Costs for this project include a 21 inch ductile iron water line to be installed from the point of connection to a reservoir location within the City. Costs also include the construction of a 5.0 million gallon reservoir within the City, and a booster station to pressurize this water to accommodate the city's pressure zone.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

First, performance of a preliminary design for the projects. Second, performance of an environmental study. The City would use our matching funds for these tasks, as usually the FONSI is required after the environmental study before funding is released to the City. Once that has been received, the City will continue with the final design of the facilities. The grant money would be used, along with the remaining balance of the City's contribution, for the construction and installation of the project.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for this Project.

Eagle Mountain City is located predominantly within the Cedar Valley area, with no surface water. The Utah State Engineer currently has a moratorium issued for water rights within the Cedar Valley, and as such, growth cannot continue without additional sources of water being identified. This water line project will allow the City to purchase and to use water rights owned by the Central Utah Water Conservatory District, so that the district can use water rights they own outside of the valley to deliver water to our system, which is in turn delivered to the residents (taxpayers).

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

Salt Lake City is requesting Federal funds to restore the historically significant building and re-landscape the grounds surrounding the building.

Detailed Description the Project.

The Albert Fisher Mansion was built in 1893 for Albert Fisher, president of the Fisher Brewing Company. The two-story, twelve-room house was designed by Richard Kletting and was built at an estimated cost of \$13,000. Fisher, who had been living at the brewery (138 So. 111 West), wished to build a home nearby. The building site was attractive in its own right, located on the banks of the Jordan River, away

from the crowds of the city, and commanding an excellent view of the Wasatch Mountains to the east.

Members of the Fisher family continued to live in the home until 1940. The home was leased by the Catholic Church as a convent for Our Lady of Victory Missionary Sisters from 1944-1973. At that time, after purchasing the property from the Catholic Church turned the building into St. Mary's Home for Men, a shelter for homeless men with alcohol or other drug addictions. In order to complete a segment of the Jordan River Trail, Salt Lake City purchased the property from the Catholic Church in 2006.

The Albert Fisher Mansion is architecturally significant as an excellent example of Victorian Eclectic style and as one of the relatively few residential designs by Richard K.A. Kletting. Kletting was one of Utah's most prominent architects and is best known for his design of the Utah State Capitol Building (1916). The Fisher Mansion exhibits the large scale and Victorian detailing common to the Victorian Eclectic style, but also incorporates into its design some unusual features such as a box-like shape, stamped metal frieze foliage, and a Queen Anne-inspired wraparound porch with Eastlake and Romanesque appointments, which combine to create a distinctively unique example of the style. The two-story brick carriage house located behind the mansion is also significant, reflecting the massing and styling of the house.

The Mayor expects the bulk of the funding will be allocated in FY10.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The Fisher Mansion is listed on the State Register as a Utah Historic Site and it's important to preserve the city's historical buildings.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The FY10 funds would be used to purchase conservation easement from the owner of Dry Lakes Ranch.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

A conservation easement on Dry Lakes Ranch would protect the water quality of Parowan City, conserve critical wildlife habitat, provide forest products and protect the view along the Brian Head Scenic Byway as well as many other public benefits.

Dry Lakes Ranch Iron County, Utah

Dry Lakes Ranch, an 1,862 acre property, is located adjacent to the Brian Head Scenic Byway. It sits just below the town of Brian Head, a resort area for summer and winter recreation that includes a ski resort. The Byway provides direct access through the dramatic Parowan Canyon to the Dixie National Forest, Ashdown Gorge Wilderness and Cedar Breaks National Monument. Forested with aspen, white fir, spruce, Gambel oak and mountain mahogany, the Ranch provides crucial habitats for fawning mule deer and calving rocky mountain elk, crucial summer range for Merriam's turkey and year round range for blue grouse. Sensitive species in the area include three-toed woodpecker, sonoran mountain king snake, goshawk, and pika; and federally protected species include the California condor and the Mexican spotted owl. This scenic property ranges from 7,600 feet to more than 9,700 feet in elevation to afford stunning views the Cedar and Parowan valleys and surrounding mountains. Demand for second homes and recreation in the area has resulted in the conversion of nearby private properties into subdivisions. The family strongly desires to keep the entire Ranch in its pristine condition to protect the forest, wildlife habitat and quality of life.

Important Project Features:

- The ranch provides habitat for the Mexcian Spotted Owl and includes fly-over and feeding grounds for the California condor.
- Dry Lakes Ranch provides habitat for a number of sensitive species including the three-toed woodpecker, the Sonoran mountain king snake and the northern goshawk.
- Parowan City uses a spring downstream from the Dry Lakes Ranch to provide culinary water for its residents.
- Dry Lake Creek crosses the property and Braffits Creek is adjacent to the property on the east side. There are also 40 springs on the property and numerous small lakes. Several wetlands on the ranch provide valuable riparian habitat as well as maintaining and improving the water quality with in the watershed.
- The Brian Head-Panguitch Lake Scenic Byway (143) crosses the property. The byway provides direct access through the dramatic Parowan Canyon to the Dixie National Forest, Ashdown Gorge Wilderness and Cedar Breaks National Monument.
- The Brian Head-Panguitch Lake scenic byway also leads to Utah Heritage Highway 89 that accesses Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks and the Grand Staircase National Monument.
- The majority of the property has been in the family since the 1890s. Historically, the property has been used for grazing cattle and sheep. The ranch is currently used for grazing 80 cow/calf pairs during the summer months.
- The owner of the ranch is in her 80's and would like to see a conservation easement in place in her lifetime. Her husband passed away a few years back leaving management of the ranch to her with the help of hired hands. Before her husband passed away he expressed his desire to keep the ranch intact. The Forest Legacy Program will allow the family to fulfill this desire.
- Located only 30 minutes from Cedar City, 3 hours from Las Vegas, 4 hours from Salt Lake City and less than 1 hour from Zion National Park and Bryce Canyon National Park. The close proximity to national parks and monuments, ski resorts, recreation and urban areas make this area a choice location for cabin sites and second homes.
- The ranch is adjacent to the Ski View and Green Meadow subdivisions, each with hundreds of homes. More than 1,000 lots have been subdivided within a half mile of the south end of the ranch. Over 14,000 lots are subdivided for cabins or second homes within a 20 mile radius of the project.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

The planning, development and implementation of a Fuels for Schools pilot project in Utah.

Detailed Description the Project.

FUELS FOR SCHOOLS is a program whereby underutilized small diameter wood is converted to chips and used to heat schools, and other public buildings. This program originated after the extensive devastating forest fires of 2000 that either threatened or destroyed properties in the dry Western States. These fires were fueled by the hazardous fuel on the forest floors and aging, diseased trees. Thereafter, the federal government initiated the National Fire Plan, to minimize future costly disasters by developing programs to: 1) remove hazardous fuel from the forest, 2) promote innovative ideas on how to use the small diameter wood, 3) promote the reduction of wildland fires to communities and 4) promote a community-based approach to wildland fire management. This National Fire Plan was the impetus to establish the Fuels for Schools program as a means to utilize hazardous fuel that is removed. Our opportunity is when we look at the utilization of not only wood but using all of Utah's rich biomass. Besides harvesting fuels from the wooded areas, we have a renewable supply from agricultural residue, city tree waste, wood waste (non-painted), and agricultural industrial waste.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be allocated.

Administrative costs: \$50,000. Feasibility studies to be conducted with several school districts: \$150,000.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The Fuels for Schools program is a federal government program designed to accomplish several goals and address a number of federal government priorities. These goals and priorities are as follows. To help reduce the fuel load which currently exist on the National Forests throughout the state. With the reduction of the fuel load comes a reduction of the type of catastrophic wild fires we have seen in recent years. The reduction of the fuel load will also assist in reducing the frequency of wild fires, the cost of fighting this type fire and most importantly will reduce the need of placing fire fighters in harms way. The reduction of this fuel load will also help improve the quantity and quality of feed available for wildlife and domestic grazing as well as improving watersheds for communities.

An additional goal of the program is to provide an inexpensive and reliable source of energy to schools. Where this program has been implemented schools have seen a reduction of as much as 73% in their energy bills. These savings will allow school districts to spend more money per student without the need of increasing taxes.

Lastly, once running this program will help provide much needed jobs for those rural communities participating in this program. The processing of the slash into usable wood chips along with the jobs of hauling the wood products to the burn site will provide stable, good paying jobs in portions of the state where such jobs are scarce.

With this being a federal government program administered by a federal agency on federal ground and whereas it will help create sorely needed jobs in rural America, this project is a justifiable use of taxpayer monies.



One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Clearfield City needs to build a new three million gallon water tank and transmission line to help accommodate HAFB/Falcon Hill developers' new and updated request for culinary water service to the new 600-acre EUL development and to improve Clearfield's overall water system for improved fire flows and pressure.

Detailed Description the Project.

In November 2006, Clearfield City completed its water system capital improvement plan. The largest capital improvement project in that plan is a two-million gallon water tank that was estimated to cost \$4,900,000 for the tank and associated transmission line. The tank is needed for increased storage for general municipal use, improved fire flows and storage for emergencies and overall increased pressure.

The water tank improvement was slated for funding and construction by 2012. However, the new Falcon Hill EUL development project on HAFB's west side has requested culinary water service from Clearfield City to begin sooner. This project is anticipated to provide an additional 8 million square feet of office development along with supportive retail establishments. This will have a large impact on Clearfield's water system. We still need our new tank, but now we need a larger tank (three million gallons as opposed to two million) sooner than expected due to Falcon Hill's request (2010 as opposed to 2012). Without this new tank, Clearfield City will not be able to provide the culinary water service requested by HAFB and the Falcon Hill developers and may impact the development's overall strategy and cost.

The first Falcon Hill building is slated to begin construction in May with additional buildings slated to start construction later in the summer. Falcon Hill's request for culinary water service and timeframe for construction is pushing up Clearfield's timeframe for construction of this new water tank.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The funds would be used to help pay for the cost of designing and building the new tank along with a new transmission line. The tank will be located on HAFB property and all funds will be expended in FY2010.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

This project is anticipated to provide an additional 8 million square feet of office development along with supportive retail establishments. This will have a large impact on Clearfield's water system. We still need our new tank, but now we need a larger tank (three million gallons as opposed to two million) sooner than expected due to Falcon Hill's request (2010 as opposed to 2012). Without this new tank, Clearfield City will not be able to provide the culinary water service requested by HAFB and the Falcon Hill developers and may impact the development's overall strategy and cost.

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

Intellectual and cultural artifacts include artifacts, collections, documents, sculpture, and works of art. Historic structures and sites include historic districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects. Preserving the historical buildings in Herriman City is important to all city residents, as these buildings preserve and protect the City’s history and identity.</p> <p>Herriman was founded in 1851 by Thomas Butterfield, who came to the southwest corner of the Salt Lake Valley in search of water. He</p>
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found a water source in the canyon west of historical Herriman. A fort was built, but never finished that provided some protection to the early settlers of Herriman. Twenty-four homes were built inside the fort. The logs for the cabins came from Butterfield Canyon, (named after Thomas Butterfield), and the rock was from a quarry known as Shaggy Peak. By the end of 1853 there were 71 residents in Herriman and Thomas Butterfield was the presiding authority. It is not known for certain when the town became known as Herriman.

Some records show the area being referred to as Fort Herriman as early as 1856. As with many Utah towns, the community was named after a prominent church leader, Henry Herriman, a member of the First Presidents of the Seventy of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. In 1860, the population of Herriman was approximately 80 people. During the following years, most of the people moved out of the fort and built homes on their own town lots or in the surrounding area. The fort was dismantled and the rock was used for homes that were built outside the fort.

The Herriman Historical Committee has identified some of the historical buildings and properties with historical significance in the history of Herriman. The objective of Herriman City and the Historical Committee is to secure these properties as funding permits and restore them to their historical condition. The overall goal is to collect and preserve the history of Herriman and maintain its historical identity. The City seeks resources for the acquisition of these properties and funding for the restoration.

As an alternative to the Save America's Treasures program, the Herriman Historical Treasures Preservation project also qualifies for funding under the congressionally-directed Economic Development Initiative in the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD EDI). 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

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Federal funds would be used to address storm drainage and flood control problems in the watershed areas of Holladay City by installing piping systems and drain pipes to reduce flooding associated with storm runoff.

Detailed Description the Project.

When the City of Holladay incorporated in 1999, many serious roadway, storm drainage, and other infrastructure problems were inherited. The City's recent storm drainage master plan identified nearly \$8 million dollars in needed storm drainage improvements. The City has identified the three most significant storm drainage problems and seeks federal financial assistance to help remediate them.

The primary purpose of this project is water quality protection. Successful remediation of each of the problem areas would help the City of Holladay to achieve compliance with the mandates of the Safe Drinking Water Act and the federal Clean Water Act. Additional benefits of the project are storm drainage/flood control and watershed protection.

Federal financial assistance for this project would help protect the nation's water resources by helping the City of Holladay to achieve compliance with the mandates of the Safe Drinking Water Act and the federal Clean Water Act. This project would allow the City of Holladay to drain a low-lying, flood-prone area in the vicinity of Hillsden and Haven Lanes. It would also help the city achieve the goal of separating irrigation facilities from storm drain facilities. This is a necessary improvement identified in the 2003 Storm Drain Master Plan for the City of Holladay to comply with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System requirements of the federal Clean Water Act.

Furthermore, the project would enhance the protection of Utah residents and businesses from the adverse effects of storm water discharges from older drainage systems and flooding. Utah is one of the five fastest growing states in the nation. From 1990 to 2000, Utah's population increased by more than 510,000 people to over 2.2 million. According to the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget, Utah's rapid growth will continue, with the population more than doubling to nearly 5 million by 2050. As Utah's population blossoms, so will the demand for Utah's limited water resources. The City of Holladay Storm Drain Improvements and Water Quality Protection project would play a significant role in improving water quality and conserving water resources. By protecting water resources, the project would also:

- Reduce the leaching of chemicals and sediments and other contaminants into streams and aquifers; and
- Segregate irrigation facilities from storm drain facilities, thereby enhancing water quality and environmental functions.

The City has embarked on an effort to repair existing storm drainage systems, following annexation from Salt Lake County in 2000. These repairs are estimated to cost between \$8 and \$10 million. While the City is working to address these critical repairs through local efforts, federal funding is vital given the additional economic burden this project would place on the residents of Holladay.

Improving storm drain facilities would also aid environmental conservation and management, including resource protection. Additionally, the total project area is of a size that would promote comprehensive coordinated conservation and management, as the City of Holladay works collectively with the Upper Canal Irrigation Company to reduce standing water and polluted storm water discharges by laying new storm drain pipes and repairing corroded pipelines.

This project would produce measurable outcomes including: reducing water pollutants and emissions, reducing the risks associated with flooding, reducing human health issues associated with polluted drinking water. The project would also enhance environmental recovery and protection by reducing standing water and eliminating polluted storm water discharges.

Wren Hollow

I. Project History and Overview:

The Wren Hollow Drainage historically was an irrigation lateral associated with the Upper Canal in Holladay. Today, that ditch conveys storm water drainage from approximately 25 acres of developed ground upstream. The Wren Hollow ditch is no longer used for irrigation. Sections of the Wren Hollow ditch run behind existing homes as shown on the attached drawing. Flooding is a problem. There is also concern about child-safety and the ditch as an attractive nuisance during run-off events. Adjacent property owners have petitioned the city to pipe the remaining sections of the ditch to correct those problems.

II. Proposed Project

The Wren Hollow component of the overall project would pipe those sections of the ditch not already piped as shown on the attached sketch. The total cost of this component of the project is estimated to be \$84,400. This budget is reflective of access limitations to the project site and the amount of work performed by hand that will be required.

Casto Lane Extension

I. Project History and Overview:

This facility was initially constructed over 30 years ago by Salt Lake County as a "temporary" solution to storm drainage for 97 acres of residentially developed area. The Wayman Pond, however, is grossly undersized with only 0.3 acre-feet of total capacity. A ten year storm event, by contrast, results in over 7 acre-feet of runoff. During normal rainfall events, the basin floods properties to the west. In the case of larger events, it was not uncommon to have significant flooding across Holladay Boulevard, the primary traffic thoroughfare through the City. Standing water was a common occurrence in the Wayman pond through much of the year. This has created a problem with both foul odors and mosquitoes.

The first phase of the Wayman (Holladay Blvd.) storm drain portion of the project was completed in 2007, with some funding assistance in the form of a STAG grant. However, the project budget was not adequate to complete the project with the extension of the storm drain up Casto Lane as shown in the attached drawing. The Casto Lane area contributes a significant percentage of run-off to the Wayman storm drain system. This storm water is currently co-mingled with irrigation water, raising concerns about water quality and the potential for increased flooding.

II. Proposed Project

The Casto Lane Extension component of the overall storm drain improvement project would mitigate ditch flooding and separate irrigation flows from the storm drain flows along Casto Lane through the construction of a dedicated 18" storm drain line. The estimated

cost of this component of the overall project is approximately \$391,000.

As an alternative, this project could also be funded through the Natural Resources Conservation Service – Conservation Operations (NRCS-CO) account of the Agriculture Appropriations bill.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

The total cost of the Holladay Storm Drain Improvements and Water Quality Protection project is \$1,175,400. A detailed cost breakdown of each of the three components of the project is listed below. EPA-STAG grants require a 45 percent local match. The City of Holladay would provide this match of \$528,930 from the City's general fund.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

State and Federal land management agencies are in need of remote sensing and GIS technology, data, and information in order to make better informed decisions. The primary problem is the current technical and knowledge capability of federal and state land managers. Most managers are not trained to process remotely sensed imagery. Further, they do not have the on-desk capability of accessing geospatial data. This effort will attempt to bridge that gap and provide federal and state managers with easy to access internet based resources in order to quickly assess landscape condition and impacts. Further, more research is needed to develop these tools. The purpose of expanding graduate research opportunities is to capitalize on the resources of various research organizations to develop these tools, capabilities, and landscape level information content to assist in natural resource management.

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

The Lake Mountain Trail Preservation Project is a joint-venture by Eagle Mountain City and Bureau of Land Management to preserve and protect the natural habitat and environment of the animals and vegetation within the project area.

Detailed Description the Project.

The Lake Mountain Trail Preservation Project is a joint-venture by Eagle Mountain City and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). The foremost purpose of this project is to preserve and protect the natural habitat and environment wildlife and vegetation within the project area, while creating public accessibility and awareness for the environment.

Several species native to the project area are federally listed as "threatened" or "endangered." They include:

- Bald Eagle (threatened), Canada Lynx (threatened), Ute Ladies-Tresses (threatened), Deseret Milkvetch (threatened), June Sucker (endangered)

The City recognizes its fiscal responsibility to the project, and to date, the City has put in over \$61,000 into environmental, cultural, and wildlife studies of the proposed project area.

Requested Language: "The Committee urges the BLM to work cooperatively with the Eagle Mountain City, Utah to establish the Lake Mountain Trail Preservation Project and to fund the improvements made on Federal lands in order to protect natural habitats, wildlife, and vegetation by planning and managing recreational uses of the area."

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Funds would be used in the following ways:

- Survey and mapping of the proposed project area; Trail upgrades and improvements where necessary; Route designations and signage for the various trails in the trail system (i.e. pedestrian, equestrian, bike and OHV control); Two (2) trailheads constructed including monument signs, encased maps of the trail system, map pamphlet dispensers, and other informational items; and approximately 5.2 miles of improved trails.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

This project will not only serve as a tool for land conservation in the area, but will also benefit recreational patrons of the trail system while creating jobs in the area for both the construction and maintenance of the project.
