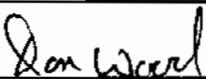
Going forward, Senator Bennett will continue to work to represent Utah's interests by ensuring Utah's priorities are adequately represented with congressionally directed spending.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

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| Clearfield City is looking to secure a grant to help combat a significant increase in gang-related activity including drugs, graffiti and vandalism. |
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Detailed Description the Project.

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| During the past ten years, Clearfield City has been experiencing a significant increase in gang-related activities including drugs, graffiti and vandalism. This is geographical consequence of Clearfield being located between Ogden and Salt Lake City, two cities also experiencing significant gang-related problems and issues. Both Salt Lake and Ogden are cracking down heavily on these gangs, which is pushing their organizations and activities to other surrounding communities such as Clearfield. Clearfield City's low-income demographics help foster the formation of gang organizations. |

Through Clearfield City's aggressive police action, we have been able to keep drug and gang-related problems from increasing exponentially; however, these problems and issues are still expanding and Clearfield is looking to secure additional equipment resources to help combat these increases.

Our request is two-fold: (1) A pole-mounted remote digital camera system to be placed throughout our public space areas (parks, trails, skate park, etc.), which are known drug and gang gathering spots, will help us monitor and prosecute any drug, vandalism and graffiti issues enacted by these gangs. These cameras would be connected to our dispatch center with 24-hour surveillance. They would not only act as a deterrent to drug activity but also as a prosecution tool with high-resolution imaging to help with identification. (2) Computer-aided dispatch (CAD) modules for wireless computer tablets for officer's use in the field. This is high-technology drug and crime fighting equipment that allows officers and dispatchers to view an individual's image and information imported from other state and local agencies instantaneously while in the field to help with identification and arrests. What's more, a component module would also permit officers to use geo-based software to show officers where drug and other crimes are concentrated for improved targeted enforcement of those "hot spot" areas. A final component module would permit officers writing citations and other report documents to swipe driver's license and other state issued ID cards into a wireless tablet that instantaneously downloads imported citations and other report files into our police system, justice court system and into the state data base as well thus lower lowering FTE costs and saving taxpayer dollars in the long term.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

(1) \$225,000 for purchasing 20 digital and remotely controlled cameras for surveillance of numerous park, trail, and public open space areas throughout the city along with associated server hardware and wireless communication equipment necessary for operation. (2) \$200,000 for 32 computer-aided dispatch (CAD) handheld tablets and the associated server hardware and software.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Through Clearfield City's aggressive police action, we have been able to keep drug and gang-related problems from increasing exponentially; however, these problems and issues are still expanding and Clearfield is looking to secure additional equipment resources to help combat these increases. By expanding and improving the technology we have, we are creating a safer environment for residents and taxpayers of Clearfield City.

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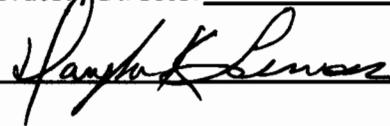

Increases support to NASA's Global Satellite-based Inter-Calibration System (GSICS) team at the GSFC and add Utah State's Space Dynamics Laboratory as a team member providing instrument performance analysis, data base development and affects studies.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

\$ 500,000 to Utah State's Space Dynamics Laboratory, Logan, Utah.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

A unified, inter-calibrated global environmental data set developed from existing and developing satellite data records is critical for accurate assessment of climate change and verification and validation of the models being developed for and applied to climate change projections.

The World Meteorological Organization's Global Space-based Inter-Calibration System (GSICS) committee is addressing this issue, and GSFC is the NASA representative to the US program. U.S. climate data goals can only be accomplished through an integrated international effort in instrument calibration understanding. This effort is led by the two U.S. agencies engaged in environmental satellite observations – NOAA and NASA. NIST is a team member supplying measurement standards. While Utah State's Space Dynamics Laboratory, an internationally recognized instrument design and calibration laboratory, has formal calibration Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) in place to support NIST and NOAA calibration and GSICS effort, it has no tie to the NASA effort. This request provides additional support to NASA's GSICS effort and adds SDL as a team member.

Two recent national workshops (Ohring et al., 2004; 2007) identified satellite sensor calibration as a primary roadblock to gathering climate quality data. Effective use of international data (especially from the new sensors being added by inexperienced nations like India, China, and Korea) requires intimate understanding of sensors and knowledgeable data recalibration. GSFC's effort to improve these sensor data streams will be significantly aided by SDL's analysis of potential instrument degradation pathways and valid recalibration adjustments.

Global Satellite-based Inter-Calibration System Support (GSICSS)

Funding: \$500,000

What: This work will provide technical support the Goddard Space Flight Center's (GSFC) satellite sensor calibration team's participation in the development of the Global Climate Observing System, an international priority and interagency coordinated effort to develop climate quality data records from existing global suite of Earth observation satellite data records.

Need: The Global Earth Observation System of Systems (GEOSS) was formulated to increase our access to global data, to improve quality of life and mitigate the effects of catastrophic phenomena. Two recent national workshops (Ohring et al., 2004; 2007) identified satellite sensor calibration as a primary roadblock to gathering climate quality data. A key recommendation was the establishment an interagency program to improve satellite calibration. The GSFC team is participating in that effort. Effective use of international data (especially the new sensors added by inexperienced nations like India, China, and Korea) requires intimate understanding of sensors and knowledgeable data recalibration. GSFC's effort to improve sensor data will be significantly aided by additional support from Utah State University's Space Dynamics Laboratory (SDL).

Explanation: Historical satellite measurements by different sensors have differed by up to 5% viewing the same scene. Accurate climate records and credible long-term climate forecasts are critical to making informed decisions on mitigation and adaptation policies. The World Meteorological Organization's Global Space-based Inter-Calibration System (GSICS) committee is addressing this issue, and GSFC is the NASA representative to the US program. U.S. climate data goals can only be accomplished through an integrated international effort in instrument calibration understanding. This effort is led by the two U.S. agencies engaged in environmental satellite observations – NOAA and NASA. NIST is a GSICS team member supplying measurement standards. While SDL, an internationally recognized instrument design and calibration laboratory, has formal calibration Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) in place to support NIST and NOAA's calibration and GSICS efforts, it has not tie to the NASA effort. This request provides additional support needed by the NASA's GSICS effort and adds SDL teaming.

Approach: Calibration is the process of understanding instrument performance and correcting its data, over the sensor's lifetime to international standards. Developing an accurate, global inter-satellite dataset requires international cooperation. The GSICS partnership is now leveraging mutli-national capabilities to achieve this goal, but the US is the key player. This effort includes expanding instrument test procedures before launch, and discovering ways to adjust existing data to minimize satellite differences. However, a detailed understanding of each nation's instruments and their potential on-orbit instrument performance degradation causes is required to assure accuracy in this process. SDL is a designated DoD national asset for space instrument design, calibration and fabrication. SDL provides instruments and calibration services to NASA, NOAA and DoD, conducts calibration conferences and workshops. While NASA develops the US instruments, their effort to support GSICS is under funded and under manned. A cooperative program with SDL will provide the additional resources needed to accelerate the development of unified standards and calibrations. GSICSS will allow SDL to work cooperatively with GSFC to assess environmental influences on sensors and to improve the on-orbit sensor calibrations being applied to the global environmental satellite data streams.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

The purpose of the project is to provide law enforcement with a local state of the art forensic laboratory to process evidence necessary for criminal prosecutions in State and Federal courts.

Detailed Description the Project.

The State of Utah only has one small forensics lab, which has a back log of DNA samples to process. Most cities and counties have to pay private labs to process their evidence so they can get it back in a timely and pertinent manor.

Funding will help the Salt Lake City Police Department, largest department in the state of Utah; the West Valley City Police Department, second largest department in the state of Utah; and South Salt Lake City Police Department work together to provide the metropolitan area with a single source laboratory that will provide forensic services, to include the most up to date DNA analysis. The purpose of the

project is to provide law enforcement with a local state of the art forensic laboratory to process evidence necessary for criminal prosecutions in State and Federal courts. This project has the potential to service all of Salt Lake County which has a population of approximately one million people.

The project would consolidate, and vastly improve, the forensic processing capabilities of several local law enforcement agencies and would be the first of its kind in the area. The advancement of DNA evidence has necessitated its use in more and more criminal prosecutions. This facility would allow law enforcement to take advantage of this type of evidence and provide it in a timely manner. This is necessary to protect the rights of accused individuals and will allow law enforcement to prosecute more cases where DNA evidence is now used.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

FY10 funds would be spent on forensic science equipment for the most up to date DNA analysis. OR FY10 funds would be used to acquire laboratory equipment to provide state of the art forensic services to law enforcement throughout the region.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The purpose of the project is to provide law enforcement with a local state of the art forensic laboratory to process evidence necessary for criminal prosecutions in State and Federal courts. Currently law enforcement in the region have to pay private labs to process their evidence so they can get it back in a timely and pertinent manor.

This project encompasses a multi-tiered approach to systems reform that coordinates local, state and national initiatives. Goals, objectives and methods strategically link RESOURCE GUIDELINES^[1][1] best dependency practices. Funding will help support NCJFCJ in working to improve the child protection system to better respond to, and meet the needs of, the children and families they serve. The Model Courts Project focuses on improving court practice in handling child abuse and neglect cases in some of the largest court systems, medium court systems and smaller court systems by serving as national “laboratories” for meaningful systems change in how child abuse and neglect cases are processed through the court and through the child protection system.

This juvenile justice prevention model has provided the ability to courts to not only improve their practice, but to provide long-term solutions to children and families. Through judicial education, strategic planning, evaluation and technical assistance, this project has resulted in reducing the time in the system for children in foster care and the numbers of children in care in jurisdictions across the country, and has improved the quality of care children receive while under the court’s jurisdiction. The Model Courts’ Lead Judges and Model Court Team members develop expertise in a wide variety of areas related to improved court practice and systems change efforts. Currently, a nationwide network of 36 Model Courts represent jurisdictions from metropolitan areas such as New York, Los Angeles, and Chicago, to smaller communities such as Dallas, Georgia and Lake Charles, Louisiana. Two of the four programs within this project are headquartered in the City of Reno, Washoe County, Nevada, within the 2nd Congressional District of NV, and the other two programs are headquartered in the City of Pittsburgh, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, within the 14th Congressional District of PA.

1. The *Juvenile Justice and Family Law Training and Technical Assistance Project* provides critical cutting-edge training and technical assistance to juvenile and family court judges and allied professionals to support improved case processing and outcomes for children, youth, families, victims, and communities across the nation.

Specific activities for FY09 include:

 - Four annual judicial training programs:
 - Core College: The Role of the Juvenile Court Judge
 - Managing Challenging Family Law Cases: A Practical Approach (in conjunction with the National Judicial College)
 - Judicial Response to Alcohol and Other Drugs
 - Evidence in Juvenile and Family Court
 - Ten state and national training program sessions/inserts.
 - Training track at the National Conference on Juvenile Justice.
 - Collaboration with allied organizations to encourage an efficient and effective approach to national juvenile justice system reform.
 - Convening a juvenile and family law advisory committee (comprised of juvenile and family court judges) to ensure relevance and timeliness of training topics and technical assistance materials.
 - Annual *Juvenile Delinquency Guidelines* All-Sites Meeting (convening of judicial officers and other court team members from jurisdictions across the nation that are implementing the *Guidelines* to pursue meaningful system reform and serve as models for other courts hearing delinquency cases).
 - Technical assistance via phone, e-mail, and onsite (approximately several hundred responses to requests per year).
2. The *National Juvenile Court Data Archive Project* provides juvenile justice professionals, policymakers, researchers, and the public with the most detailed information available on the activities of the nation's juvenile courts. Project collects and analyzes automated case records compiled by juvenile courts nationwide in order to provide detailed information on activities of the nation's juvenile courts. .
To accomplish this the project performs several roles:
 - Data collector—collecting information on more than 1.5 million juvenile court cases annually;
 - Data developer—extracting research data files from administrative data sets;
 - Data archive—the project documents and preserves all of the original data as well as the restructured data files;
 - Data disseminator—making data files available to researchers and policymakers;
 - Research center—produces *Juvenile Court Statistics* and special topic studies;

Technical assistance provider—the project works with state and local agencies to improve the design, quality, and utility of their information systems and information technology projects;

Information clearinghouse— staff respond to requests from federal, state and local agencies, the media, researchers, and the public for statistical information based on the activities of juvenile courts and other aspects of the juvenile justice system.

3. The *Permanent Families for Abused and Neglected Children: A National Training and Technical Assistance Project (or Child Abuse and Neglect Institute (CANI))* provides an interactive learning forum designed exclusively for judicial officers handling child abuse and neglect cases. NCJFCJ has successfully planned and implemented CANI annually since 1998, reaching 384 judicial officers in 38 states, Puerto Rico, and Guam. CANI provides core workshops on relevant topics including, the role of the judge, judicial leadership, substance abuse and permanency planning, best practices in the handling of abuse and neglect cases, child development, the Indian Child Welfare Act, and judicial ethics. CANI also includes case applications and strategic planning sessions to assist judicial participants in developing strategies for implementing best practices when they return to their individual jurisdictions. The funds compensate staff, provide materials, compensate faculty, and provide for all logistical support for the training program.
4. The *Technical Assistance to the Juvenile Court Project* provides the best available information and assistance to juvenile courts, probation, and justice professionals nationally which is particularly crucial to the over 3,000 juvenile court jurisdictions nationally that, typically, do not have research and development departments. The following are the program objectives:
 - Enhance and expand the availability of first rate technical assistance resources by providing experienced project staff, in-house informational resource centers, links with juvenile justice practitioners throughout the US, and information dissemination.
 - Provide *one-to-one* technical assistance by responding to requests for information by individuals who contact NCJFCJ in-person, by phone, by e-mail, and by mail.
 - Provide *one-to-many* technical assistance through on-site or cross-site consultations, jurisdictional workshops, conference presentations, topical publications, and the posting of informational E-packets on our website.
 - Establish an on-line presence, including a dedicated technical assistance website, *The State Profiles Website* <http://www.ncji.org/stateprofiles>,¹ informational e-packets on selected subjects, original monographs and other publications, and links to other sites and publications.
 - Document, track, and evaluate the technical assistance requests received and help provided in an effort to promote continuous quality improvement of the technical assistance tools and products made available.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Requested funding for this project, which provides state-of-the-art information, training, and research to judges and other juvenile justice professionals in order to improve decision-making and resources to better serve the needs of children families, while ensuring accountability from them and the systems who serve them, will support four national programs that strive to improve system effectiveness and judicial decision-making for children and their families in cases involving juvenile delinquency and child abuse and neglect. This project addresses objectives of the Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Through the project, courts and system professionals receive the timely information, training, and research which will provide improved decision-making and resources to better serve this population, while ensuring accountability from them and the systems who serve them.

Federal funding would continue to support provision of continuing education, training, technical assistance and research services to an estimated 30,000 judges, probation officers, attorneys, mental health, detention, child welfare representatives and others annually. Continued Federal funding will (1) support cutting-edge training and technical assistance for juvenile and family court judges and other court personnel in order to improve practice and outcomes for children, youth, families, victims, and communities; (2) support collection, processing, and archiving data files representing more than 30 million juvenile court cases, produce more than 40 *Juvenile Court Statistics* and other reports, scores of bulletins and fact sheets, and hundreds of web-based data resources, and support project staff providing hundreds of presentations and provision of information to a wide variety of audiences from the White House, Congressional groups, and other federal juvenile justice policymakers, to state legislators, Supreme Court Justices, and other justice decision-makers, to local officials and juvenile justice professionals, to academic researchers, college and high school students, to the news media, community groups, and individual citizens; (3) support the Child Abuse and Neglect Institute (CANI) and technical assistance each year; CANI provides an interactive learning forum designed exclusively for judicial officers handling child abuse and neglect cases and has been successfully planned and implemented annually since 1998, reaching 384 judicial officers in 38 states, Puerto Rico, and Guam; and (4) support collection, organization, and targeted dissemination of the best available information regarding effective juvenile justice practices to juvenile courts and probation, other juvenile justice practitioners, academics, legislators, media representatives, etc.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

Continue to bring together the resources of higher education, private business, and public education to improve school success for at-risk students.

Detailed Description the Project.

This task will be accomplished by training school-based teams to identify at-risk students as early as possible through screening and then to use data to make intervention decisions that will help prevent juvenile delinquency. The extension of this project will allow us to involve more schools and many more students.

The three goals of this grant are to: 1) Improve faculty access to students' academic and behavioral information via the district data systems; 2) Enhance early identification of students who are academically and/or behaviorally at-risk for school failure and juvenile

delinquency; and, 3) Improve faculty data-based decision making skills to choose evidence based interventions.

EXPANDED PURPOSE: Each of these goals requires school faculties to receive targeted training in the following areas: (1) entering and accessing student data using their own district's data systems; (2) academic and behavioral screening procedures, and classifying students into low, medium, or high risk categories based upon the screening; and (3) data based decision making in both academic and behavioral programming.

The resulting decisions about students will take place in regularly scheduled, administratively supported, professional learning teams. Participants in a professional learning community (PLC) explore three crucial questions:

- What do we want each student to learn?
- How will we know when each student has learned it?
- How will we respond when a student experiences difficulty in learning?

We know that answering these questions is what separates truly effective school-based learning communities from typical schools. It is the aim of this initiative is to provide the tools, resources, and training that will allow teachers in their PLCs to regularly analyze student data, share their teaching practices, and evaluate their students' progress on each of these critical questions.

Progress on the grant will be traced by four measures: 1) The percentage of faculty trained in the use of their data systems; 2) The percentage of faculty trained in academic and behavioral screening; 3) The percentage of faculty who complete academic and behavioral data-based decision making training; and, 4) The change in the percentage of students classified as at-risk. In addition, other formal research studies beyond the reporting requirements of the grant will also take place.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The safety and performance of U.S. public schools remains a major concern among public agencies and citizens. Data collected in 2004 indicate youth between the ages 5-18 experienced 863,000 thefts and 583,000 violent crimes at school (Dinkes, R., Cataldi, E.F., Kena, G., and Baum, K., 2006). These data, coupled with the nearly 100,000 incarcerated youth in the U.S. contribute to the perception of the dangers associated with the school environment (Snyder, H. N., & Sickmund, M., 2006).

Twenty to 50% of all the high-risk behaviors among youth can be linked to poor academic performance, unstructured free time, and association with antisocial or delinquent peers (Farrington, 1989; Hawkins, et al, 2000; Maugin & Loeber, 1996; Moffit, 1993). Additional school, community, and family factors are also statistically related to various forms of antisocial behavior (Biglan, 1995; Hawkins & Catalano, 1996; Mayer, 1995; Patterson, Reid, & Dishion, 1992). However, comprehensive and intensive efforts to build academic skills, social skills, and self management skills have been found to increase academic achievement for students at risk from two to five times over expectations, while improving social competence according to nationally standardized measures (West, Young, Mitchem & Calderella, 1998). Direct measures show remarkably stable reductions in fights and suspensions (-69%), safe school violations (-77%), court referrals (-84%), and gang-related activities (-81%) (West, et al., 1998).

Schools adopting comprehensive and intensive intervention strategies can have a significant impact on the rising challenges facing young people. Due to this unique opportunity, it is increasingly important that schools and their collaborating agencies and constituencies focus on developing: (1) a supportive learning community; (2) systematic approaches to promoting safety and positive behavior; (3) involvement of family, students, school staff, and the surrounding community; and (4) standards and measures to support continuous improvement based on data (Learning First Alliance, 2001).

OTHER: As noted throughout, initial funding for these activities in FY 2008 resulted from a congressionally designated project secured by Senator Bennett and came in the form of an award to Brigham Young University, with a substantial subcontract to USU. Schools in Ogden City School District, Alpine School District, Nebo School District, and Wasatch School District are also participating. Furthermore, a major corporate partner, Digital Bridge, a Utah company, is contributing expertise and resources to this project. Senator Bennett was personally thanked for his leadership on this project at a recent luncheon attended by representatives of the two universities, all the schools and school districts, and Digital Bridge. Senator Bennett's familiarity with and support for this

project bodes well for continued funding success.

One Sentence Statement of Purpose for the Project.

To improve and upgrade current technology used in the field by law enforcement officers to more effectively conduct their duties, disseminate information, and efficiently resolve matters at hand.

Detailed Description the Project.

The Sandy City Police Department has identified several areas of technology which is currently being used by officers to conduct day-to-day field operations which are in great need of upgrading or replacement. One of area of great concern is the need to replace/upgrade the officers' in-car video cameras. These cameras have become quite a necessity not only for investigative purposes, but for officer safety issues and training as well. The department's current cameras are reaching an age where they are out of warranty and will cost thousands of dollars to repair or replace them. Grant funding would allow the department to replace many of the older video cameras with newer upgraded models which have much higher quality video and audio components.

A second area of need is in the replacement of the officers' in-car laptop computers. These computers have become one of most important tools officers use in their day-to-day operations. The laptop computers allow officers to complete reports, citations, pull state and national information, etc. out in their assigned beat areas. This provides more police presence in the community at any given time. Grant funding would allow the department to replace many old laptop computers which have gone over their useful life span and have been "bandaged" to work for the time being. New laptop computers are faster and more efficient.

The last area of concern of the Sandy City Police Department is the current implementation of a city-wide meshnode system. The department started construction of a meshnode backbone system in 2007. With the assistance of various sources of funds, several locations in the City have been equipped with cameras. These cameras assist the department in watching specific locations for criminal activity, including drug activity, traffic flow, etc. which in turn, assists the department with directed enforcement assignments and criminal identification. With additional funding, the City will be able to complete the system, which would include monitoring of local water sources.

State Exactly How the FY10 Funds would be Allocated.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Technology is in a never-ending cycle of evolution. Equipment and technology becomes obsolete at a quick pace and agencies need to try to keep pace with the changes. By upgrading and improving equipment and technology, Sandy City law enforcement will become more adept at keeping up with the criminals and crime in their community.

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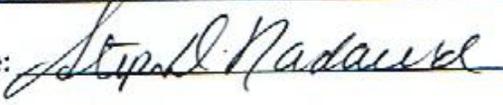

Project would enable NCSC to offer increased research, education, technical assistance and information services to the state courts at the direction of the Conference of Chief Justices and the Conference of State Court Administrators.

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On an annual basis, state courts average more than 102 million court filings – or more than 98% of all litigation filed in the United States. These numbers illustrate the critical role state courts play in adjudicating our nation’s legal disputes. With more than 30,000 judges and 20,000 courthouses nationwide, state courts serve as the backbone of this country’s justice system, upholding laws enacted on both the federal and state levels and applying federal policy.

This project impacts state courts and those served by the state courts across Utah. Federal funding for the State Courts Improvement Initiative would enable NCSC to offer increased support services in three key areas: Knowledge Information Services (KIS), which acts as a library and clearinghouse service for state court personnel (much like CRS for Congress); Education and Technical Assistance for judges and court personnel struggling to interpret and apply federal policy and promote a more effective administration of justice; and National Court Initiatives and Research, which would help the state courts identify and meet daunting challenges in top priority initiatives, such as immigration, healthcare, emergency preparedness, foreclosures, habeas corpus, and court security. This project will allow additional NCSC services to enable judges, court administrators, and key court personnel to meet current and future needs, make fair and impartial decisions, and save time and money.

The State Courts Improvement Initiative will facilitate more timely resolution of civil and criminal cases, help reduce the cost of litigation, improve access to court services and improve the quality and experience of jury service. By helping courts provide a stable and efficient means of resolving disputes, the work will also contribute to a functioning economy, and aid courts in dealing with children and families issues fundamental to the social fabric of our society. Finally, the project will enable Utah courts to be more transparent and accountable thus contributing to a better managed government through improved administration of the courts.

State Courts Improvement Initiative Budget

\$500,000 - Knowledge Information Services (KIS): KIS serves as a library and clearinghouse for Congress, federal agencies, and state court constituents, identifying and disseminating best practices on all matters related to court administration and state courts. Funding would help meet increased demand as courts are faced with greater federal requirements and enable NCSC to provide Congress with information regarding policy implications of federal proposals. Currently, Congressional requests to the Federal Judicial Center yields information regarding implications for federal courts only.

\$750,000 - Education and Technical Assistance: Education programs (both in-person and via distance learning) will be developed for judges and court personnel as they implement federal policy in areas such as: court security, sexual predators and stalkers, child welfare, human trafficking, data exchange and the sharing of criminal history information, court interpretation, and complex litigation, and immigration. Limited on-site technical assistance also would be available to states with implementation challenges.

\$750,000 - National Court Initiatives and Research: NCSC will research and distribute information needed to implement federal policy and respond to major issues currently facing state courts as identified by CCJ, COSCA, and other key court personnel such as immigration, terrorism, healthcare, emergency preparedness, global epidemics or pandemics, and court security.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

The Preamble to the U.S. Constitution provides that one of the functions of the federal government is to establish justice. Courts are the ultimate entity through which justice is rendered in this country. Ninety eight percent of all litigation is conducted in state courts thus for the federal government to discharge its required role in establishing justice, it must support the functioning of the state courts. With more than 30,000 judges and 20,000 courthouses nationwide, state courts play an important role in the interpretation and application of federal policy. NCSC serves as the most efficient mechanism for communication, education, training, and implementation of successful practices for the state courts across the United States. Further, ever increasing federal requirements and more complicated types of litigation – such as mass torts, complex commercial litigation, foreclosures, and evidence-based sentencing – are causing increased demand for NCSC services. All 50 states, the District of Columbia, and the territories participate with NCSC. Congress has long held a strong commitment to supporting law enforcement. Historically, however, the leadership role that state courts play in the interpretation and application of federal policy is often overlooked and misunderstood. The challenge remains that many projects of importance identified by Congress, CCJ, COSCA, and other key state court officials do not align with the specific federal grant programs available to NCSC. As a result, some high priority initiatives are not funded.

The Methamphetamine project was created as a task force to combat the heavy presence of drugs and gangs in the Uintah Basin.

- **Utah Internet Safety 101: Empowering Parents Program DVD & Workbook:** reproduction and distribution through Utah multi-sector affiliation partners (including direct distribution via web, media, and special events). - **Utah Internet Safety 101: Empowering Parents Program Online Resources:** will provide the mechanism for Utah residents to download and order the Utah Internet Safety 101: Empowering Parents program and will have other links to information about Utah Internet Safety 101 Town Halls and teaching seminars.
- **Utah Public Awareness Program:** to include media Interviews/Free Media (Radio, TV, Print, & Internet); Public Service Announcement Program (see below); and paid-media campaigns. EIE uses affiliation networks for distribution and public awareness to ensure that these critical materials gain the broadest possible distribution and do not suffer the fate of many materials prepared for similar social efforts. EIE President Donna Rice Hughes is a recognized national expert on Internet child safety issues and she and other EIE spokespersons are regularly invited to appear on regional and national media to discuss child safety issues. Ms. Hughes and other designated spokespersons will utilize these opportunities to encourage Utah audiences to adopt *Rules 'N Tools*SM at home.
- **Utah Public Service Announcements (PSAs):** EIE has developed a core group of radio PSAs based on the "Rules 'N ToolsSM tip of the Day" messaging. EIE will be expanding their PSA program to include TV PSAs, which will include specific Rules 'N ToolsSM guidelines; provide statistics pertaining to predators and pornographers; and deliver a consistent, easily understood safety messages to parents. EIE's partners and other supporters will be asked to subsidize cost of development, publication, insertion and/or broadcast of the PSAs.
- **Partnership/Grassroots Enhancement:** to expand Utah child-safety partnership network with the Internet industry, faith-based organizations, not-for-profit institutions and government agencies to enhance EIE reach and foster long-term sustainability for EIE materials and programs in Utah.
- **Utah 101 Train-the-Trainers Program:** Community leaders and partners will be trained and equipped to host community-based events and grassroots mobilization strategies to prevent online victimization. Trainers will also be briefed on program updates and expanded resources as applicable through train-the-trainer conferences, when participants will learn how to deliver high-impact Internet victimization presentations and teachings.

- **Utah State Coordinator:** Direct partnership and grassroots efforts to influence localized institutions, non-profits, faith-based, law enforcement, etc. groups to adopt Internet Safety 101: Empowering Parents and to motivate adults to implement protective measures to increase youth online safety.
- **Utah Program Evaluation:** Pre- and post-training surveys to measure implementation of Internet Safety 101 Rules N' ToolsSM in participating audiences. The goal of the Internet Safety 101 program is to change the behavior of parents, educators and other childcare providers to be the 'First Line of Defense' to protect children from threats online.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

Technology has provided us with access to a wide range of valuable services, but over the past several years, a number of dynamic and destructive dangers have merged to create a perfect storm scenario for the online exploitation of our children. People seeking to victimize our children suddenly have unparalleled access to our children; for the first time, sexual predators and pedophiles can communicate anonymously with our children in the safety of our homes without our knowledge. Obscenely graphic and addictive pornography lurks only one click away from innocent youth; 70 percent of youth 8 to 18 years of age have accidentally come across pornography¹, and the Internet has become the leading technology for distributing hard-core and child pornography. Nearly 100 percent of public schools in the United States have Internet access, and social networking websites have attracted millions of teenagers, many willing to meet with strangers: 16 percent of teens considered meeting someone they've only talked to online and 8 percent have actually met someone they only knew online². Kids are feeling pressured to post provocative pictures and videos and blog about their deepest personal experiences in a very public forum, and few teens are thinking through the implications of their online actions.

Significant gaps exist between the Internet's dangers to children and the level of legal, enforcement-based, and Industry-driven action dedicated to protecting children. In this ever-changing world, parents are the first line of defense against child Internet victimization, but parents are often overwhelmed, uninformed or ill-equipped to adequately protect their kids online. Teens whose parents have talked to them "a lot" about Internet safety are more concerned about the risks of sharing personal info online than teens whose parents are less involved. For instance, 65 percent of those whose parents have not talked to them about online safety post info about where they live online, compared to 48 percent of teens with more involved parents, and teens whose parents have talked to them "a lot" about online safety are less likely to consider meeting face to face with someone they met on the Internet (12 percent vs. 20 percent)³. While existing parental support systems are helpful, they are inadequate to equip parents and other adult childcare givers with the knowledge and tools they need to protect their kids. Current online and off-line methods have not persuaded parents to take action. Although a number of resources for parents are available online, most parents do not learn online; parents are more comfortable with offline, instructor-led teaching seminars and more traditional forms such as radio, TV and in-person discussions, precluding a large percentage of parents from ever hearing the Internet safety message.

Children of low-income parents on the other side of the digital divide are especially vulnerable. The reality is that parents, guardians and adult child caregivers of all educational backgrounds and demographics have been delegated by default the primary task of protecting our children from Internet dangers, but a systematic, community-wide approach is lacking. *Internet Safety 101* fills a void in the marketplace for Internet safety training since it directly reaches the homes and hands of parents and childcare givers through both traditional and online multimedia resources.

Congress is authorized to designate funds to prevention and education programs within the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program, which is authorized by the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization

of 2005 (Public Law 109–162). Additionally, Congress is authorized under Title II, Part E of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (42 U.S.C. 5665-5667) to designate funding for activities related to juvenile justice and at-risk youth, including development and implementation of effective and coordinated prevention and intervention programs as they protect public safety. The Utah Internet Safety 101: Empowering Parents program is designed to prevent the online exploitation of youth through delivering evidence-based prevention resources directly to families in the commonwealth. The Internet Safety 101 program targets adult behavior by promoting implementation of Internet Safety Rules ‘N ToolsSM through education and awareness training, because parental involvement and adoption of Internet Safety Rules ‘N ToolsSM will result in a direct percentage decrease in Internet-initiated sex crimes against youth.

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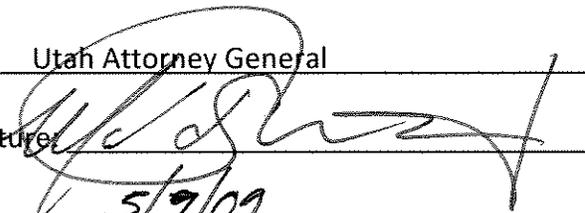

Utah Meth Cops program is a detoxification pilot program established and administered by the American Detoxification Foundation to help law enforcement officers that are experiencing detrimental health effects from their exposure to harmful chemicals involved with the

duction of methamphetamine during the course of duty.

Detailed Description the Project.

The Utah Meth Cops program is a detoxification pilot program established and administered by the American Detoxification Foundation to treat law enforcement officers that are experiencing detrimental health effects from their exposure to harmful chemicals involved with the production of methamphetamine during the course of duty.

The 'Hubbard' detoxification protocol is designed to cleanse the effects of drugs on the body using exercise, nutritional support and sauna therapy to enhance detoxification. The same protocol has been used to successfully treat approximately 1000 recovery workers in New York City who were involved with the efforts at the World Trade Center.

During treatment, scientific data will be gathered and analyzed by Dr. Gerald H. Ross. This data will include comparison of before and after case study for each officer participating in the program, the effect of the detoxification process and the degree to which severity of symptoms are relieved.

Both the data and testimonials from the officers who have undergone the Utah Meth Cops treatment protocol display a significant improvement in the physical health and quality of life of the officers. Federal funding will provide the necessary resources to continue this important pilot project, and expand it to help more officers harmed during the course of duty.

Although Utah law enforcement agencies have been on the cutting edge of shutting down meth labs and Utah officers have been disproportionately exposed to harmful chemicals, this situation is not unique to Utah. This project is intended to be a model pilot program for replication in other states for their law enforcement officers suffering from similar exposure.

Justification for the Use of Taxpayer Funds for the Project.

From 2000 through 2007, Utah led the nation in reducing the number of dangerous meth labs operating throughout the state. Officers who participated in these raids often spent as much as three hours inside the 'meth houses or meth labs' collecting, labeling and cataloging evidence to be used by prosecutors. Frequently, police raids were timed to coincide with the cooking of the meth, at which time toxic chemicals and methamphetamine fumes were almost always present.

It was only within the last few years that medical evidence has been coming to light demonstrating that as many as 50% of these Utah officers are now suffering long term serious illnesses and sometimes life-threatening diseases because of their prior work protecting our children and families. Many of these officers have had to take extended sick leave or retire for medical reasons directly related to their exposures to these meth-related chemicals.

Over 80 of the narcotics, undercover and SWAT team officers throughout the state remain ill with mounting evidence that they are suffering long term health deterioration as a result of their participation in these raids and the associated exposure to methamphetamine-related chemicals. In the past year, at least four of these officers have died from cancer and other forms of disease that are unusual in their age group, and which are highly suspected of being directly attributable to their exposure to toxic methamphetamine and related chemicals.

Utah is a leader in combating the drug trade and should be a leader in protecting the officers who are on the front lines.

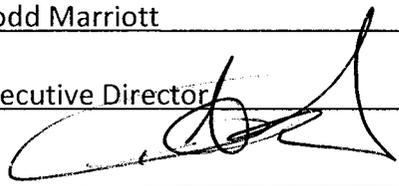

Working with private and not-for-profit organizations like Sorenson Communication and Intermountain Healthcare to identify technologies and technology modifications that can take advantage of fiber optic connectivity to enhance the quality of life and telecommunications environment of individuals requiring medical monitoring or needing alternative telecommunications options.
2. Working with UTOPIA's member communities, agencies serving them and the partners mentioned above to identify individuals willing to participate in pilot testing of the devices and processes identified above.

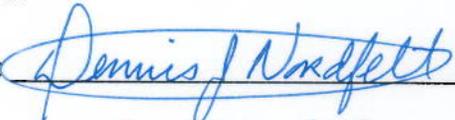
